FROM THE PRESIDENT'S SHOP...

Confessions of a novice wood turner

Thomas Jefferson once said, "Though I be an old man, I am but a young gardener."

Confession Number One: Though I be an old man, I am but a young wood turner!!! When I first started coming to CTWA, two or three years ago, I thought sandpaper was a tool. You could shape with it (30 grit), take out your mistakes (80 grit) and smooth with it (120 grit). After a while, I had heard the motto, mantra and slogan of demonstrators: "Use sandpaper like it belonged to someone else." I was totally confused. They would also allude to the fact, "I usually start with 220 or 320 grit on my pieces;" i.e., you can gauge your abilities as a turner by what grit you start finishing the project with. AH-HA, a gauge by which to measure progress. I fell in love with this idea, but I was still confused by what this OPSP (Other People's Sand Paper) was all about. So in the summer of 2004, I went in search of OPSP. It had to be different than my sand paper. I would feign reasons to visit another shop for instruction or to observe. Was that ever enlightening. They showed me how to turn wood with a lighter cut, shear cutting.

I couldn't believe it. The reason they depended on such a fine cut finish was the OPSP they used. I didn't even know you could use it in that shape. When I grumbled about its ability, they would beat it

on the tool rest, while some pulled out a wire brush and tried to clean it. All proudly said, "Lots of life left in this puppy." I worried. On trash day, do I have people going through it looking for something they can convert to OPSP? So now I am thinking of selling it on E-bay as OPSP.

While at the SWAT Conference in Temple, I nosed around the demonstrators supplies looking for OPSP and found only Klingspor cloth backed paper never used. Most had torn it into 1" strips and stapled it into books. One demonstrator tore 1" postage stamp size pieces off and sanded with these small portions. I think they pocketed it, because I could never find the postage size pieces after the demo. I swept the floor and kept a close eye out. I thought I might have them sign it.

Confession Number Two: The other thing I learned was how not to burn my fingers while sanding. That question brought smiles from all. There were two answers they all gave me: A - sand at slower speeds and B - put the paper on the end of your electric drill and power sand.

Pretty easy. Here all this time I had been putting 4-5 coats of Thick Hot Stuff on my finger tips to protect them. Well it worked when you practice the guitar.

My confessor told me to stop inhaling dust while turning and to stop cussing when I ruined projects with the skew. I think some one has already written that vignette, "The Taming of the Skew."

Lyle Jamieson to Demonstrate at CTWA in March, 2005

Stacey Hager has contacted Lyle Jamieson and arranged for him to conduct demonstrations and hands-on sessions here in Austin in March, 2005. Lyle is a world renowned turner of hollow form sculpted pieces. Stacey says he is one of the best teachers of turning he has ever studied with, on the same level as Stuart Batty. Details of both the two days of demonstrations and the two-day hands-on session can be seen in detail at www.lylejamieson.com/instruction-classes/index.asp.

There will two days of demonstrations, March 12 and 13, at American YouthWorks, our regular meeting site. These will run from 8:30 to 4:30 and will cost \$30 per day. We need at least twenty people each day to break even for the event. This will be followed on Monday, March 14, by one (or two, depending on the preference of the people participating) day(s) of hands-on instruction for five or six people. These sessions will be held in Charlie Kay's shop (bring your own lathe) and will cost \$100 per day per participant. The topic(s) for the hands-on sessions are yet to be determined, but probably the first day will be on basic skills (see website, above) and the second day, if there is enough interest, would probably be on hollow form turning. In addition, Lyle is available on March 15 and 16 for detailed individual instruction for one or two turners at a special rate of \$250 per day.

HO Evans has again graciously consented to handle registration and arrangements for the sessions. The prices above are set to cover the basic costs of the events. If we get more participants, we are suggesting that any funds received over costs should go to the lathe fund.

Mark your calendars (I know, you don't have your 2005 calendar yet) and get in touch with HO and get your name on the list. We will be publicizing this to other clubs in the area and inviting their turners to join us for these events. This should be a real chance to learn from another master turner.

We would appreciate those of you who are interested in participating seeing HO and getting your money in early.

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Dues are Due for 2005

You should soon be hearing from Drew Shelton about paying your dues for 2005. As usual, he will be collecting both your CTWA dues and your AAW dues, as we are a 100 per cent AAW affiliate. You should have received your AAW election ballot and dues statement with your last copy of *American Woodturner*. By all means, send in your ballot, but DO NOT PAY

YOUR AAW DUES TO AAW! You need to get a check to Drew for \$60. This covers your CTWA dues (\$25) and your AAW dues (\$35). You need to get your information in before the end of the year to be in the 2005 AAW directory and be eligible for the drawing for the Powermatic lathe. If you have had any change in your address or E-mail address, you need to advise Drew of that as well.

Meeting Location
