Tolly's Travels

Johnny and Marcia Tolly were out on the road again on October 8. They traveled up to Belton and the Brazos Valley Woodturners Club where Bill Meador hosted the monthly meeting in his nice shop. Johnny demonstrated how he makes his inside-outside Christmas ornaments. His demonstration covered the selection of woods, wood orientation

for grain matching and how to turn the inside of the ornament. Marcia then

explained how she does the pyrography on the inside. Then Johnny demon-strated how he glues the wood back together and cleans out the excess glue and how he uses the loved, or hated, skew to turn the outside. He discussed how to make the drives to finish turn the Christmas ornament outside, including how to use sandpaper to get a smooth outside on the open parts of the ornament. Next he demonstrated how to turn a finial for the top and the icicle for the bottom of the ornament. These were both turned using black diamond wood which really makes a nice looking ornament. There were 16 people in attendance, a great start for a new club. Numerous questions were raised and a good time was had by all. Johnny left the newly turned Christmas Ornament for the club to raffle off during their November meeting.

> It is again time for us to start thinking about electing our officers for next year. While we normally nominate officers in October, and elect them in November, there are some advantages to at least identifying candidates before SWAT. That allows the incoming Program Chairman to see a number of potential demonstrators at SWAT and at least make some preliminary contacts.
