## Opportunity

It seems that just about the time you think things are settling into a regular pattern and everything is under control, a new "opportunity" presents itself. It doesn't really matter what particular aspect of life you're contemplating, little surprises always seem to pop up. I tend to view most of these as part of life's big adventure; just think how boring it would be without these challenges.

A case in point is our meeting time and location. For some time, there has been an undercurrent of dissatisfaction over the travel time require required for some of our members to attend the meetings. The biggest

source of dissatisfaction seems to be the traffic delays, as opposed to the actual distance traveled. So, a few of us have been kicking ideas around.

The ideal solution would be a nice, air conditioned facility in central Austin with adequate locked storage for all our stuff. That way, all of our members would be equally inconvenienced with the travel time. However, despite the best efforts of a number of folks over the last seven years or so, we haven't been able to locate such a place. Oh, yeah, did I mention

that the rent needs to be free as well? We've met in five places in the last seven years, two in north Austin, one in far west Austin and two in South Austin. We left three of those places because they were too small and one because we were asked to leave.

While the location isn't the best for everyone, otherwise our present meeting facility is about as close to ideal as we are likely to find. It is large enough for our needs, has secure storage for our stuff and accommodates

If someone were to come up with a central location that met all or our criteria as well, then maybe relocation would be worth considering. However, it seems to me that relocating to another edge of Austin doesn't solve the problem. It just changes the folks who are unhappy about the location.

A novel solution that has been proposed is to change the time or our meetings. Several clubs have Saturday meetings, which largely avoids the traffic issue. For me, this suggestion was one of those Ahah! moments. Having Saturday meetings would have several advantages while addressing the travel time concerns for everyone. It would allow us to follow the model used by the Kerrville, Houston and Temple clubs, who all have their business meeting, demos and hands-on "First Saturday"-type meetings all at the same time. (Yes, I know Kerrville meets on a Thursday afternoon/evening, but their meetings are structured quite differently from ours.) And it would let us keep our present excellent meeting facilities.

One downside to this idea is the potential for impacting folks who have other commitments on Saturdays. For those members who have children or grandchildren involved in various activities, this meeting time might force them to make a hard decision about where to spend Saturday mornings once a month. However, this proposal would definitely address the time and traffic concerns with our current situation.

In summary, I am willing to work on this issue in order to come up with an approach which works best for a majority of the members. What I need from you is some thoughtful insight into how to best approach the problem. I appreciate the concerns

## Spinnin', spinnin', spinnin'...

Our July meeting saw long-time CTWA member and past President **Bill Hammack** demonstrating his seven piece top. The hollow top was inspired by the old-fashioned sheet metal tops with the spiral ratchet drives.

Bill's first challenge was in coming up with a way to drive his top. He came



up with a method of using a nail, a dowel, a piece of PVC pipe and a wooden handle. A string is then used to spin the top. All in all, the drive system contains five pieces.

The top itself is a lidded box, consisting of two pieces. Hence, a seven



piece box. Bill glues up layers of hard maple to make the bottom, and fewer layers of your wood of choice. The top and bottom are then hollowed like bowls, with a mortise in the top to accept a tenon the bottom like a lidded box.

Bill uses a jig to cut a slot in the PVC

pipe. A hardwood dowel is then sized to slide easily inside the PVC pipe. The ball for the top is turned to about 1 1/4'' diameter using a short pen mandrel, after first drilling a 1/4'' hole in the blank. A short blind hole is drilled in the bottom to accommodate



the PVC pipe, which has to length to fit properly, and a 9/16" hole is drilled all the way through the top.

The outsides of

the two pieces of the box are now finished and sanded.

A hole is drilled all the way through the dowel shaft about 1/4" from the bottom end to accommodate a nail that will slide easily in the slot in the PVC pipe. The shaft is marked at it's minimum and maximum extensions above the top of the top and a 1/8" hole drilled all the way through for the string. The top of the dowel is then turned down to 1/4" diameter for a length equal to the handle ball plus 1/4".

The PVC pipe is now glued to the top and the drive shaft is inserted and the top and bottom are glued together. Glue the handle on the shaft, get a string and you're ready to start spinning.


