As We Begin a **New Year**

Simply Spindles

Our demonstrator for January is Judy Williams, CTWA's own Mistress of Lace Bobbins. Judy describes her demonstration plans this way:

I am a spindle turner and although I specialize in lace bobbins I do, at times, turn larger pieces as well. This will be a demonstration of techniques of spindle turning with emphasis on tool control and the use of various kinds of tools. Although this demonstra-

tion could be classified as a basic "how to", I hope that members will be able to take away a tip or two to enhance their own turning.

For far too long, spindle turners have not been given their due recognition in the turning world. Usually a new turner will mangle a pen or two and go on the bowls and vessels and being very "creative." Spindle turners often get classified as only production turners (think furniture legs, chair rugs, etc) yet there is far more to this type of turning than merely duplicating beads on a stick. This demonstration will show how different tools cut wood as well as the many ways a single tool can cut.

Now some further thoughts from President Elect Craig Timmerman:

Our First Saturday sessions have been a great way to see different shop configurations, exchange ideas and there' has even been some woodturning going on!

These First Saturday sessions were started as a way to get "hands-on" time with some of some of our more experienced members. However, some of these sessions have become more of a social meeting rather than turning instruction, not that there is anything wrong with that. However, some of our members who are new to turning may not be getting the help they would like.

Therefore, we are suggesting a minor

change as to how the First Saturday sessions are structured. While several members bring lathes to these sessions, you never really know what is going to be turned. So at each first Saturday, we would like us to have one or two scheduled informal demos. These demos will be "simple" projects that most new turners can accomplish. After the project has been demonstrated, anyone who wants to try the project will get hands-on time and some coaching. There are many simple projects we can do: lidded boxes, weed pots, pens, goblets, spheres, tops, eggs, small platters/bowls, etc. Perhaps by knowing ahead of time of at least one or two projects that will undertaken, we can get more participation in these sessions.

Since the next First Saturday is at Stacy's shop it is only fitting that the first project will be a "fun with the skew" project. I will also be there doing simple boxes for anyone who is interested. I will help Len coordinate others who are willing to demo something at each First Saturday session. If you would be willing to be a featured demonstrator/instructor, just Len or me know. It doesn't have to be fancy. It just needs to be a simple project that you can turn and one that is not intimidating to beginners. This is open to everyone. You just have to have a desire to show someone else how turn something We can all learn something from one another. You don't have to be at every First Saturday. Just let me know which ones you will commit to.

You newer turners can also help out. First let me know what kinds of simple projects you are interested in. Second, if you haven't been to a First Saturday session, give it a try.

One final thought. We don't want to change the casual atmosphere of the First Saturday sessions. We just want to add a little structure to get more involvement from our newer members. As always, feel free to bring a lathe and turn whatever you want, come to see the different shop layouts or just come to socialize. It's all about having fun turning.

To volunteer to host a First Saturday Shop Crawl, get in touch with Len Brissette.

For those of you that haven't heard. Pat and Clyde Little have lost their home to a catastrophic fire. Len Brissette has the most information, and passes what he knows on to us in the following write-up.

As I understand it, on New Year's Eve, just past midnight, Pat and Clyde turned off the lights to go to bed and saw an orange glow

in their bedroom mirror. He went to investigate and found their motor home fully involved in flame. As the motor home was parked within about ten feet of the house, they called 911, and ran to get garden hoses to work on the fire. Almost immediately thereafter, the fire had spread to the eaves of the house, at which point they realized that it was a lost cause.

They managed to get his Chevy Tahoe out of the garage only because the keys happened to be in the pants he threw on. Her Cadillac, parked just behind the motor home, had the keys in it and was saved as well.

The fire department took about 15 minutes to arrive (Volente VFD) and quickly ran out of water. Ironically, although Clyde lives on the lake, it was too far to the water and the household pump was not working as the fire department had pulled the meter to the house for safety reasons. The house was a total loss, as was the motor home. The shop was located far enough away that it was not affected.

The cause of the fire has not yet been determined. However, the insurance agent for the motor home told them the refrigerator in the motor home is at least suspect as the manufacturer has had a number of recalls and insurance claims, although not on this particular model.

Fortunately, they have pretty good insurance and are okay as far as their immediate needs are concerned. Many friends and neighbors have pitched in to help. Pat and Clyde have moved into a townhouse on RR 620 and plan on living there while they rebuild their house on the lake.

Several of us have been discussing organizing a "pounding" for them some time very soon. This is an old tradition in which people bring basic household supplies for folks who have had this type of terrible catastrophe. We do not have specifics yet, but are working on it. If you want, for now, consider bringing something to the meeting - a magazine, comfort food, or other useful item - to help them get through the next couple of weeks.

From the Editor's Desi

This will mark the 67th issue of the Chip Pile I have cobbled together for the Central Texas Woodturners Association. When I did the first primitive version in January of 2000, I never figured I would still be doing this seven years later.

The funny thing is, I volunteered at first because I figured that was something I could do for the club that didn't require any woodturning skills and didn't involve too much responsibility. Plus, I knew I kind of enjoyed writing and thought it might be fun. It continues to be.

I trust that all of you had a nice holiday season and are now recovering from

your overindulgence. We had a great Christmas with all of our family. It is good to have them all close by and everyone healthy.

I have been spending a fair amount of time in the shop since Christmas, but not very much time turning. Our youngest son, the musician, got a Martin guitar kit for Christmas. Just because it is a kit doesn't mean that you just glue it together. There is a lot of fitting and adjustment to do and lots of gluing and clamping. The instruction manual also leaves a lot to be desired. This is not an undertaking for someone with no woodworking experience or tools.

This son has always been the most interested in woodworking as an adult, with lots of projects, but none requiring fine hand tool work before this one. He has my old radial arm saw and an old bandsaw and some power hand tools, but usually comes out here when more sophisticated tools are required. Needless to say he has been out a lot in the last couple of weeks.

Mostly I show him techniques and coach him as he works on it. Plus it usually takes the both of us to devise jigs and methods of clamping. There have been a lot of problems to solve. The back and top are glued up and the braces glued in place and the sides have been glued together. The next step will be the most challenging so far. The Engleman spruce braces under the top must be carefully pared down to thin and lighten them without weakening the tops ability to withstand the stress of tightened steel strings. This is done by paring a bit and thumping the top, and contiunuing to pare and thump until it "sounds right." The process sounds a little nerve wracking to me, and apparently has a major effect on whether you wind up with a good guitar or a great guitar. Obviously it helps to have some musical skills to go with your woodworking skills.

Adam is a meticulous worker, and I expect this will be a fine piece when he is done. He is taking copious notes and photographs and already planning his first guitar built from scratch. The Grizzly catalog has him drooling for instrument wood.

For quite a long time, I have thought it would be interesting to try and build a guitar, and even bought a book on it several years ago. A book, I might add, that has been very helpful in this project. However, the task looked more than a little daunting, and I began to doubt that I would be able to handle the "tuning" of the soundboard top. So I am enjoying helping on this project. Plus, I don't have to worry over making a big mistake and blowing the whole thing. He gets to do that.

I expect that the project may be done by next month, and if so, I will include some photos.

Now, I need to get back to turning. I had my most successful craft shows ever in October and December. I have some great ideas that now need to implementing. Plus, thanks to Hogan Hardwoods big closeout sale, I have some interesting new pieces of wood to turn.

Speaking of Hogan and the closing of their counter sales, all of us to need to thank **Dave Dick** for all the support (and wood) he has provided to the club and to us individually over the years he has run the counter sales. We trust he will wind up with a good job that he enjoys out of all this. Meanwhile, the rest of us must find a new place to go for our hardwood sup-

Our thoughts go out to Clyde and Pat Little as they try to put their lives back together again. We can only be happy that they escaped safely. The rest can be replaced.

This really is a family that we belong to. The connections go beyond our common interest in wood and the things we can do with it. That is just the spark that brought us together.


