From point of view of technique , making jewelry on the lathe is not really difficult. When you examine the procedure closely, it consists of simple spindle work and face plate techniques. The creativity aspect is in the

On a cold, gray and dreary February 3, some 15 of us gathered in **Stacey Hager's** cozy shop. Most impressive was his esoteric collection of heaters to warm up the normally unheated shop. Stacey was conducting tutorials in the use of the skew his Oneway 2436, followed by a second session on sharpening. A large group was paying close attention to both discussions.

When Stacey was done with the skew session, **Drew Shelton** set up his ElboTool on the 2436 and let various folks try it out. **Craig Timmerman**, meanwhile, was demonstrating turning small boxes on his mini-lathe on the other side of the shop. **Frank Miller** had set up his vacumn gouge on Stacey's Delta mini-lathe, and several folks tried that device.

Meanwhile, in the solarium, the ladies were exploring the complexities of pyrography.

As 2007 gets underway, Johnny and Marcia Tolly are on the road again. This is the eighth consecutive year that Johnny has demonstrated for the Alamo Woodturners Club. This year, at their January meeting, he showed them how to make wind chimes. The wood used was Texas mesquite and the tubes were made from copper tubing. The demonstration first showed how to

tune the copper tubes for the correct tones, called the Node. Following this, Johnny turned the top, clapper and sail. After all the parts were turned, the chime set was assembled and donated to the club to raffle off at their next meeting. There were more than 30 people in attendance. The crowd seemed to enjoy Johnny's demonstration and several indicated they would try their hand at making wind chimes.

On February 9, Johnny and Marcia traveled over to Kerrville where Johnny demonstrated to more than 40 members of the Hill Country Wood Turners. Again, he demonstrated how to make wind chimes using copper tubes and mesquite parts. Though there was some problem with the lathe, Johnny was able to complete his demonstration.

Planning is well underway for another great SWAT Symposium this fall in Wichita Falls. SWAT Board Members and Committee Chairs met at the Convention Center in Waco on January 27 to get the process started.

The 2007 Symposium will take place from October 5 through 7 at the MultiPurpose Event Center in Wichita Falls. Lead demonstrators will be **Stuart Mortimer, David Marks, Alan Stirt, Cindy Drozda** and **J. Paul Fennel**. The Regional Lead will be

CTWA's own Stacey Hager.

Registration will begin on Friday morning, and demonstration rotations will start at 1:30 PM. The Symposium will end at 3:00 PM on Sunday.

This year's Board meeting saw the Board wrestling with SWAT's growing pains. As those of you who attended last year's Symposium in Temple are aware, SWAT has grown too large for that venue. While the facility in Wichita Falls is first rate and large enough, it is located far from the demographic center of the organization's members. There is no simple solution to resolving those problems. With those thoughts in mind, the Board directed the Executive Committee to proceed to enter negotiations with the Convention Center in Waco for using that facility long-term, beginning in 2008.

The SWAT Registration fee for 2007 will rise to \$125 for an individual.

Included in this will be another halfday of demonstrations, an additional lunch on Friday, a fifth lead turner and the packet of demonstration handouts that we had to purchase separately last year. In addition, part of the increased fee goes toward the increased cost of renting the facilities in Waco beginning in 2008.

Expect the first SWAT 2007 newsletter to appear on the newly revised SWAT website, www.swaturner.org, early in March. That issue will give considerably more details on plans for the Symposium.


