Twisted and Scary Thoughts

We were very fortunate to have Michael Hosaluk as our Spring demonstrator/instructor this year. The demonstration sessions were excellent. He started out by showing us how he turns a ball. All he does, in his words, is "make it round". Yeah, right. But in just a couple of minutes he had a ball, and he turned on just one axis. He then picked up a burning tool and in a few minutes had transformed it into a baseball. He attempted wood bending using a microwave, but the ash he was using was uncooperative and split. He went on to show us some examples of his various surfacing techniques,

much of which involves burning and

paint. He made several items, with my favorite being what I describe as a "twisted animal horn".

As good as the demos were, the hands-on class was even better. Seven of us trashed Bob Waltz' shop for three days (Thanks, Bob!). I still can't turn a ball on one axis to save my life, but I'm improving. This ability is necessary for one of Michael's projects: a ladle turned from a single piece of wood. Since the bowl of the ladle

has a handle attached, the multi-axis methods of turning a ball won't work. The scary part is hollowing out the bowl while the handle spins around just daring to take on someone's knuckles.

We turned fish that looked like they came from elsewhere in the galaxy. There's a scary part to that project as well - the fish start out somewhat egg-shaped, but then it goes to the bandsaw to slice out a section centered along the axis. The remaining

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parts are glued back together to make something shaped like a large almond. Add a bizarre arrangement of toothpicks, paper and paint, and you have a fish.

We also made the twisted animal horns. We turned them, hollowed them (my first real use of a hook tool), sliced them and glued them back together. But that's only about a third of the project. To produce his final product involves lots of carving, sanding, and surfacing to make what appears to be a single, continuous surface. I don't have a power carver, nor do I have the patience to do it without one, so I find myself "in the market".

As always, having a guest demonstrator is a good excuse to get rid of those annoying piles of cash that build up around the house. Michael sells his own hook tools, handles, and handle inserts. He's also a dealer for P&N tools. We made sure that his luggage was much lighter on his return trip.

Many thanks to **Stacey and Betty Hager** for getting Michael to and from the airport and supplying him with room and board for five days. Thanks also to **Bob Waltz** for hosting the hands-on classes. They made it all possible.

with only one leg? Unfortunately, none of our contributing photographers managed to get a shot of the finished stool or Dave trying it out.

Thanks, Dave, for the excellent dem-

onstration. Now we just have to locate a cow!

Doug Green was the winner of a pair of reversible candlesticks (Joe Kirk design) turned from hickory and finished with Deft by Bob Waltz. John Thompson took home three winestoppers (Indian rosewood, Osage orange and pecan in a bubinga holder) turned by Joe Kirk and finished with Hut wax. Visitor Dyana Pluof picked up the threelegged stool turned from Spanish cedar that Dave **Dick** had turned earlier. Finally, Jack Besperka was the lucky winner of the one-

legged stool turned by Dave Dick during the evening's demonstration.

As is the custom, each of the winners of the first three items will bring back a turned item to the next meeting. As always, visitors do not have to bring



back a piece. One of the officers will provide one instead. The Bring Back items should be representative of each person's best work.



It should be noted that the Bring Back Raffle is meant to be a fun event. No one is grading you on the quality of your work. Just bring a piece that represents the best that YOU can do. If you don't have a lathe or feel like you have enough experience, contact one of our Volunteer Instructors to help you prepare a Bring Back piece. So buy a ticket, get involved and have Stan Spell brought a sycamore bowl and a cherry nut bowl, both finished with lacquer.







Ho Evans showed off a "segmented" lamp finished with brass/ bronze/gold lacquer (yes, it was only "segmented" because it split and he had to glue it back together).

Jack Besperka brought two ash Indian pots, one bleached, textured and carved and the other dyed and



torched to give a black on black effect. Both were finished with lacquer.

New member John Huber showed off a 1:32 scale model of a 24 pound cannon for a model of the USS Constitution, turned from ebony. John got interested in turning as that was the





only way he could get the cannons for his model.

Craig Timmerman brought a pair of square bowls, both featuring both upturned and downturned wings, in response to a question from Drew Shelton as to how one might accomplish that.



Johnny Tolly showed off four rolling pins of rock maple with wenge, pink ivory, zircote and purpleheart handles.



Frank Miller shared a set of six red oak hole plugs to finish off screw holes in a project. Frank turned these at the April First Saturday.



Charlie Kay brought a sycamore box with a mesquite lid, finished with Master Gel.



Jim Spano showed both a box and a tool handle.

Jim Brinkman shared a rolling pin of oak, maple and mesquite, finished with walnut oil.





Mack Peterson showed off five pieces of various descriptions, as well as a bowl full of boxes turned to fit bur oak cups.









Turned Music

Our May meeting will feature Johnny Tolly demonstrating how he makes wind chimes using copper tubing and turned mesquite parts. Handouts and a supply list will be provided. The top, clapper and sail will be turned with the aid of a vacuum system. This part of the demonstration will include a primer on using

the vacuum system, as well as the various techniques for drilling the various parts. Johnny will discuss tuning the copper pipe chimes as well as the kinds of pipe required.

We had 50 attendees at our April 17 meeting, including seven visitors.

Looking for Guinea Pigs

I am pleased to announce that I recently accepted an invitation to teach my first out-of-town, hands-on class. Dates are still being finalized, but it looks like I will be going to Birmingham, Alabama, later this year

to teach multiple classes on square bowls. As this will be my first class, I want to make sure I'm as prepared as possible. What I would like to do is make a trial run of the class in my shop. The main thing I need for the class is four guinea pigs, i.e., students. So, I need your help. The first four people who tell me they are interested get to participate.

There will be no charge for the class but I ask you bring one or two pieces of wood to trade for the mesquite that I will be furnishing for the class. There are two prerequisites for the class: 1) You must have your own mini-lathe and tools. The class in Alabama will be on mini-lathes so that's what I would like to practice with. 2) You must have a basic understanding of bowl turning (e.g., you have turned at least two round bowls of your own). I will cover the basics of square turning and each student will get a chance to turn two small square bowls. If time permits I will cover more elaborate square bowl styles. The class will be approximately four hours long and will be held on a Saturday some time in late June or early July, depending on how our schedules work. I will coordinate the date with the participants once I get four volunteers.

Many thanks to the CTWA for helping me get to a level where I can go out and give this a try.


