Where is That Gouge?

I have been making a rack for my turning tools. It's something I've wanted to do for a few years, but there have always been more interesting projects to work on. Until now, my tools have been in a pile on an old, small table next to my lathe, with the tool I want always at the bottom. I bought tools from Michael Hosaluk back in April. This caused the tool pile to achieve critical mass. It no longer wanted to remain on the table, so I knew I had to do somethina.

Thus I have been taking advantage of the First Saturday meetings to pay attention to the tool racks our members have. I've

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seen lots of different designs, all with advantages and disadvantages. I settled on PVC pipes tilted at 45° suspended between pieces of wood. The tools fit inside the pipes with the handles facing up. I even made it so that it can stand on the same table as my mini-lathe when I attend a class. When it's next to my big lathe, it will stand on a wooden cart - as soon as I make the cart. In the meantime, it's used to hold my tool

Bigger is **Always Better**

Our own Larry Walrath is well known for his large hollow form turnings and large sets of nested bowls, so he set out in his July demonstration to tell us how to handle and turn large pieces successfully. How large? As our club Oneway 1640 is small by Larry's standards,



he checked first to find out the maximum size piece he would be able to mount on the lathe.

Larry began his session with a nice slide talk on big wood. When we talk about big wood, we're talking



about whole tree trunks, a heavy duty tandem trailer, an oversized diesel pickup and a Bobcat to get the logs off the trailer and onto his bandsaw mill, all of which were shown in his slides. Additional slides showed how

c/o Charles Kay 100 Matzig Cove Buda TX 78610-3108 he handles the large blanks, as well as how he cores the large blanks for the nested bowls and how he mounts and turns the large blanks.

After the slide talk, Larry mounted a large log section between centers on the lathe. Yes, it fit, but with almost



no room to spare. He then turned the blank round and showed how he squares off the end and mounts the blank on a face plate so that he can



shape and hollow it. He then mounted a prepared blank on the headstock and proceed to show us his hollowing technique. Although he didn't use it



in his demonstration, Larry showed us his custom large steady rest, complete with wheels from a garage sale rollerblade.

Thanks to Larry for a well-organized and thorough presentation. It was informative and helpful for all of us.

Lay an Egg

Curtis Turner is our demonstrator this month. and here is what he has planned.

Turned eggs are the kind of project that kids and adults never hesitate to pick up and admire. Eggs are a great way to "collect" samples of different species of wood. Despite its simple form, an egg

presents numerous turning challenges. Fortunately, eggs have a range of acceptable forms and sizes that feel right. Egg turning makes for great practice. Turning a simple egg helps to train the eye, hand and mind. The flowing lines of the egg can find their way into many other turned projects, such as the curves of spindles of all types, ranging from finials, goblets, balls and even bowling pins.

This project requires a minimum of turning tools, simple chucking options and some scrap wood. The finish can be as simple as a quick spin through a buffing system.

We had 44 attendees at our July 17 meeting, including seven visitors.

There were no significant action items at the June Business Meeting.

Johnny Tolly reminded us that the SWAT Symposium is scheduled for the first weekend in October in Wichita Falls.



Joel Crabbe thanked folks who have turned in their basswood canes for the carved eagle heads for injured soldiers to pick up their blanks before heading home. He reminded those who still have blanks to get them turned and to him.

National leads for 2007 are Cindv Drozda, J. Paul Fennel, David Marks, Stuart Mortimer and Alan Stirt. Our featured regional lead demonstrator is Stacey Hager.

Cindy Drozda is a full-time woodturning artist from Boulder, Colorado and has been turning since 1985. She

has worked with wood since 1977. She is well known for her elegant burlwood boxes and containers topped by delicate finials. Cindy's trademarks are precise techniques, fine details, pleasing forms, and exploring the elements of successful design.

J. Paul Fennel has had

an interest in turning wood dating back to the early 1970's. His work has been focused on the aesthetic of the hollow-form vessel, forms are derived from variations of simple, but pleasing classical shapes. Paul's recent focus has been on surface texture, carving and other treatments on these forms. He resides in Scottsdale, Arizona.

David Marks has been a professional woodworker since the 1970s, and shifted his focus to woodturning and sculpture in the 90s. He is well know for his patinated finishes, which combine painting, gilding, chemical patinas and lacquering techniques. His finished pieces have an ancient petrified stone look about them. David is a resident of Santa Rosa, California.

Stuart Mortimer has been turning wood since 1969. He holds the world record for the largest bowl turned from

> one piece of wood. He is well known for his spiral turnings, and is the author of *Techniques* of Spiral Work. Stuart resides in Hampshire, England. He has taught and demonstrated throughout Britain, Europe and the US.

Alan Stirt considers himself a "bowl maker" more than a wood turner. While the turning process fascinates him, it is the resulting bowl that commands his interest. Alan uses patterns, whether created by grain structure, organic fluting and carving or repeated geometric shapes, to enhance his pieces. Al resides in Enosburg Falls, Vermont.

Stacey Hager grew up in a cabinet shop, did some turning in the 60s, but began turning seriously in the 80s. Stacey is well known for his knowledge of tools and tool making, and has written several articles on tool making for the AAW journal. His woodturning interests cover a broad range, from large bowls and hollow vessels to long, thin spindles.


