








FOR SALE: Model RF-30, 2 HP heavy-duty, combination, milling/drilling machine with cabinet stand, R8 spindle taper, 28 3/4" x 8 1/4" table with T-slots, with X,Y, and Z travel calibrated to .001", 12-speed (100-2500 RPM), weight 660 lbs, width 39 3/4", length 42 1/2", height 73 1/2". This machine is like new. I bought it 11/21/1990 for \$1159.98. A similar model is on sale today for \$1400 plus S&H. I am asking \$600. I just got a full size Bridgeport-style mill and do not have room for both.

Model 750X Drill Doctor, top-ofthe-line professional model drill-bit sharpener. Best current on-line price is \$139.95. I am asking \$100. I bought this machine to sharpen carbide bits because it had diamond grinding wheels. I used it three times and then got diamond wheels for my bench grinder. I am also selling some antique fans (dating back to the 1890's), antique typewriters, antique kerosene heaters and hotplates, several modern "squirrel-cage" type blowers (for shop fans), hand tools, and other "good stuff". 
