angiosperms, which typically have broad leaves and are usually deciduous (i.e., they lose their leaves during winter, like maple, oak, aspen, cherry and ash. Since these woods have vessels, they are also called porous woods. In contrast, softwoods are from the botanical group gymnosperms, which are conifers such as pine, cedar and fir, most of which are most often not deciduous. As these woods lack vessels, they are sometimes called nonporous woods.

the center that was running closest to true and identified this as the section that he would leave to form the natural edge rim of his birdhouse roof. He then rounded the two ends, leaving a



section in the middle with the bark still on it and turned a tenon for the chuck on each end. He parted off the longer of the two rounded ends to reserve to make the body.

He then chucked the shorter piece and proceeded to make the roof. He



first cut a tenon on the bottom that would allow it to fit into the bottom of the birdhouse and drilled a depth hole using a drill bit chucked in the tail stock. After shaping the roof, Dave hollowed the inside using a spindle



gouge, with the tool rest set very low and the handle down on the gouge. He hollows from the center hole. This technique allows him to hollow quickly, cutting both coming out of the box and going back in. Once the hollowing is complete, the outside of the roof is refined and the piece parted off.

The bottom blank is mounted in the chuck and hollowed after setting the diameter at the top to fit snugly on the roof tenon. The technique is exactly the same as for the roof, except that an entry hole for the bird is drilled before hollowing begins. Dave does not put a perch below the

hole. When the hollowing is done, the outside is refined and parted off.



Snap the two parts together, put in a couple of tiny screws to keep the parts together and put a hanger eye in the center of the roof and, voila!, you have a birdhouse. Or is that a small hollow stool with no legs? That makes it even easier to get it not to wobble.

Great job Dave, and we expect to see birdhouses showing up at Show and Tell soon.

From the Editor's Desi

I must begin this month's column by thanking the folks who made it possible. Without notes from **Betty** Hager, photos and identifications from Gene Stokes and a DVD of the demonstration ably executed by Frank Miller and Jim Spano, there would not have been much of a newsletter this month. Many, many thanks to all of you for stepping up on very short notice.

Janie had fallen on the previous Thursday evening and broken her hip, although she didn't know that at the time. A trip to the doctor and x-rays revealed the damage and she got al call

from the doctor about 4:00 on Friday telling her to stay off that leg until she could have surgery. He arranged an appointment with an orthopedist for Monday afternoon. The orthopedist scheduled surgery for 3:00 on Tuesday, the day of our meeting. I sent E-mails to a number of folks, including those named above, asking them to cover for me if I didn't make the meeting. It was well I did, as she didn't actually get into the operating room until after 5:00.

The orthopedist put a couple of pins in to hold the bone in place while it heals, which should take about three months. She is recovering nicely and getting around pretty much wherever she wants to on her walker. She has really not had any pain with it and is frustrated that he won't let her drive yet. We are thankful that it was no worse.

I have been doing a little turning, but I have been kinda busy for the last month! I have been making a bunch of sea salt boxes. I sold out the four or five I had on hand before Christmas and immediately got calls for a couple of more between Christmas and New Years. I made four more and sold them all within the week, so I need to replace them. I am also started on some more of the inverted funnel salt boxes as I sold out of them as well. I also have to get some more baby rattles turned, as I have sold three of those since the first of the year. With the hit my IRA took with the financial meltdown, I am happy for any little bit of income I can get.

There are a few of our members who are old enough to remember the Great Depression and a lot more of us who were born near the end of it and whose lives were greatly influenced by it because of the effects that it had on our parents. There is a new biography of FDR that came out several months ago. It is titled Traitor to His Class, by H. W. Brands. Brands is an excellent and very readable author. His discussions of the efforts of FDR and his team in dealing with the desperate economic situation the country was in take a different tack than the many other accounts I have read over the years. If you are interested in that sort of thing, particularly in light of our present difficulties, I would highly recommend this book to you.

It was nice to get 3/4 of an inch of rain over a couple of days this week. Nice, but far from what is needed. A couple of the salt boxes I turned were from a big pecan tree that I blocked up six or seven years ago. In those pieces, you can clearly see the horrific drought that Texas suffered in the 1950s. There are twelve or thirteen yeas of growth rings that are 1/32 " or less wide. It is difficult to count them because they are so thin. There is one year in the middle that is a little wider, and folks must have thought that the weather had turned for the better, only to find their hopes crushed the following year. This pitiful run of thin rings is surrounded by rings 1/16 to 3/32 " or more. That was when all of Texas had about the same population as metropolitan Houston does now. I don't like thinking about this any more than I do the financial collapse.

I think I better quit before I get any more dire thoughts.


