Our demonstrator for our September meeting was CTWA founding member **James Johnson**, now with the Hill Country Turners in Kerrville. James showed us how to make "pods" or "squirts." As James was CTWA's second President, he



was introduced by our first President, Gary Roberts.



James began by placing between centers a blank made up of two identical pieces screwed together on the ends. Leaving an inch or so of waste on each end where the screws are, he turns the blank round in the center and tapered toward each end.





James then sands the blank before removing it from the lathe and unscrews the two pieces of the blank and then reassembles them with the

turned sections facing each other. The new outside is then turned, the piece removed from the lathe and the shaping of the ends using a bandsaw and a grinder.



The two finished pods are sanded smooth and decorated as desired, using pyrography, paint, carving, etc. The result is an interesting object that you want to pick up and play with. Looks like a fun project.

with lacquer. **David Kastner** was the lucky winner of a small fluted mesquite bowl turned by **Peter Hawkins** and finished with salad bowl finish and Beall buffed. Finally, **Hilda Carpenter** took home a box elder bowl turned by **Bill Hammack** and finished with Deft and wax.








**Steve Green** brought a square cherry platter, carved and painted and fin-ished with lacquer.

**Joe Kirk** showed a pair of fan pulls of redheart and silver maple, finished with beeswax.



**Peter Hawkins** brought along three pieces, a plain bowl of pecan, a large fluted bowl (48 flutes) of mesquite and a magnificent hollow form turned from a mesquite burl with multiple voids. All were finished with salad bowl and Beall buffed.





**Johnny Tolly** showed off a pair of garden tools and an ice cream scoop with handles turned from mesquite and finished with tung oil and wax.



New turner **Hilda Carpenter** brought along a practice spindle of cedar, representing her first attempts with a spindle gouge.



Visitor **Anna Rachinsky**, from Hill Country Turners, brought earrings and pendants made from mesquite, walnuts, and hickory nuts and finished with wipe-on poly and tung oil. Anna is to be our demonstrator in January.



Finally, **Charlie Kay** showed off a pair of lidded bowls, one of sycamore with a walnut lid and the other of ambrosia maple with a walnut lid and a palm nut finial. Both were finished with Waterlox and Beall buffed.



There were 56 people at our September 15 meeting, including two visitors. **President Clyde Little** conducted the business meeting.

In our brief business meeting, Clyde called for volunteers to man the CTWA demonstration room at the SWATurners Symposium. A camera operator and a host/helper are needed for each demonstration session. A sign-up sheet was passed. Clyde will prepare a final



## Thoughts on Rain and Human Nature

I spent the first weekend of October at the Buda Fine Arts Festival. Yes, I had a successful show, thank you.

We have been fortunate to receive all of the rain we have gotten in the last month and a half. It is at least making a dent in the drought. It did make for an interesting weekend, however. On Friday, the grounds were too wet to unload at the big white tent, so I had to cart everything about a block before I could set up shop. Then on Saturday, it was threat-

ening all morning, before the bottom dropped out of the sky and eventually the northern end of the tent began to flood.

All of the booths on the west side had at least some water in them and the northern-most booths had about a foot of water. The northeast corner, which the band was evacuating as quickly as it could, had about 18 inches of water before it began to go down. That was after someone noted the foot high berm of sand and the hay bales they had put in place on Friday. There was a big puddle on the north end of the tent, and they were apparently concerned that if we got a big rain, water would somehow flow uphill and flood the caterers space and the band space. When the berm was breached and the hay bales removed, the water drained off. Surprise! But, not before all but four booths (including mine) had at least some water in them.

Despite the deluge, the customers kept coming and despite a disastrous Friday evening, I had a really good Saturday. The weather was better on Sunday. At least it didn't rain much, but it was warm and muggy. We are never satisfied I guess. Sunday's business was pretty good as well, and I got a couple of new wholesale customers as a result of this show.

Despite the occasional trials and tribulations of outdoor shows, I really enjoy craft fairs. It is always interesting talking to and observing the people. I get lots of questions, particularly about the woods. Wood is a medium that everyone feels that they can relate to, I think, as opposed to painting or pottery or jewelry, for instance, which people seem to feel require a little more specialized understanding. You can always get a conversation going when they pick up a Chinaberry piece or a hackberry piece. Folks are always astounded that anything useful can ever come from what they regard as trash trees.

I am also interested in the differences in the way men and women react to things. There are no absolute differences, of course, but after ten years of doing this, I have observed certain trends.

As a rule, men will walk right up, start picking pieces up and asking questions, while women will frequently look with arms crossed until you invite them to pick stuff up. Then the questions begin. One of the most noticeable differences I have noted is the way people react to boxes. Men generally comment favorably if the box lid fits snugly, as they hold it sideways to take the lid off. Women, on the other hand, are more likely to be pleased that the lid comes off easily as they hold the box upright to open it.

I have noticed that women are far more likely to be attracted to the lighter colored woods and men to the darker colored woods. One of the strangest things I have noted is the words used to describe the smoothness of the wood. I get frequent comments on how smooth the wood is, and smooth is always the word used by men. While women sometimes use smooth to describe the surface, they very frequently use the word soft instead. I first encountered that usage about eight or nine years ago. My oldest granddaughter, then about eight, liked to come to the shop and ask if she could help. What she really wanted to do was sand something. So I would give her a piece of some sort, an assortment of grits and let her get to work. Each time she was ready to move to a finer grit, she would bring it to me, rubbing the surface with her hand and asking, "Is this soft enough,

#### Grandpa?"

We humans are mysterious creatures, and I think we have only begun to understand the ways that we think and the ways that we are the same and yet different. Nurture is important, but nature still seems to have a lot to do with who we are and how we think.

Now, I'd best finish this and get it off to Larry to post on the web site, then get out to the shop and get ten mesquite stoppers with Ranger star inlays ready for my new customer. I need to get that done before I head to SWAT on Thursday morning.


