# Banksia Pod Box

(

CTWA stalwart **Len Brissette** was our demonstrator for June. For his project, he showed us how to turn a finial box from a banksia pod.

Len had already cut the ends off the pod with his bandsaw before he started. He placed it between centers by eyeballing the



centers of the core of the pod and turned a tenon on one end to fit his chuck. Because of the porous nature of the pod, he stabilized the tenon with thin cyanoacrylate (CA) glue and hardener. From there it was conventional box making. He chucked the blank with the tenon, turned the inside of the lid and parted it off. The lid was then placed on a jam chuck with tape for security and the outside turned, end-





ing with drilling a stopped hole for the finial using a 1/4'' brad point drill with the brad ground off (to assure that the bit doesn't drift off center).

The top of the blank is then stabilized with CA glue, the interior of the box hollowed and a ledge is turned inside the top for the lid to sit on. The box is parted off and jam chucked and the outside and bottom are turned.

**Steve Green** showed a pair of his maple platters with crushed stone stone inlay, one featuring a herd of turtles and the other a tree.





**Chris Van Peski** brought three tea lights of mesquite, laser pierced and finished with wax.







**Jim Brinkman** showed a vessel of pecan finished with Deft and Beall buffed.

## Basic Bowl Turning

Our demonstrator for July will be **Ken Mays** from the Brazos Valley Club.

Ken has been turning since 1947. He spent 28 years in the Air Force as a fighter pilot. After retirement he was in home construction, then worked for a civil engi-

neering firm and was later the Director of Utilities and City Planning for the City of Woodway. For the past 15 years he has done commercial turning of stair balusters for a local renovator. Ken's specialty is bowls and small hollow forms. He enjoys turning large items such as 16 inch bowls and trays. His guidance on bowl and platter turning is "let the grain and beauty of the wood determine the shape". Do not ruin a beautiful piece of wood with a pre-determined pattern. His presentation will cover harvesting wood for turning and basic bowl turning. Safety around the lathe will be stressed.



There is still one major woodturning Symposium left on this year's schedule and you should make an effort to attend, particularly if you have never attend one of these events before. It will greatly expand your view of woodturning and what you can do with it and you will meet lots of interesting new people.

#### SouthWest Association of Turners Symposium August 24 through 26 Waco, Texas

Affectionately know as SWAT, this annual symposium is second in size only to the AAW Symposium. There were 821 woodturners at last year's Symposium. It also has a great Instant Gallery and trade show. Best of all, it is by far the least expensive. Advance registration is \$130 and registration at the door is \$160. Plus, it is only 100 miles up the road. If you are a new turner and are looking for inspiration and three days of great demonstrations, you really should plan to attend this. After skipping the AAW Symposium for the last several years, I made it to this year's event in San Jose. I can assure you that the SWAT Symposium is fully as useful and inspiring as the the national symposium, and at considerably less cost. While it may not always be true, the size of this year's trade show in San Jose looked to me to be smaller than the one last August in Waco. While the number of pieces by big name turners was much larger there than what we see at SWAT, I don't think there were as many total pieces displayed as we had last year.

### **Spouse's Events**

As always, there will be programs for non-woodturning spouses at this year's Symposium. This year, there are some exciting new things to try.

#### Writing Short Memoirs: Treasure, Story and Truth Friday 2-4 pm

This workshop is inspired by writing down family sto-

ries that are too good to be forgotten. Participants are guided through short writing activities inspired by personal photos, family recipes, or small wood kitchen tools. Each person should bring 3 or 4 items (e.g., old photos, recipe cards, a wooden spoon, rolling pin, etc.) to describe an experience you can't wait to write about and share. The idea is to have some fun writing down the stories behind the objects we treasure. Bring your objects and your own pen or pencil. Paper will be provided. No cost. Limited to 12 participants.

#### Basket Making - Garlic Basket Saturday 10-12 noon

We had so much fun making baskets with Pat last year, that we have asked her to teach us another basket. This year she will teach us what is called a garlic basket, although it can be used for many purposes as it is a hanging basket. Previous experience is not needed. Cost of class is \$7. Limited to 12 participants.

#### Kool-Aid Dyeing a Silk Scarf Saturday 2-4 pm

This workshop will teach the basics of Kool-Aid dyeing. It is fun and easy to do. It is nontoxic, so its great for doing with kids. There will be a silk scarf (8"x54") supplied for the class and additional scarves will be available for purchase. You might want to wear old clothes or bring an apron or smock, as this can get a bit messy but is fun! Cost of class is \$15 Limited to 12 participants.

#### Book Club Sunday 9:30-11 am












### **Meeting Location**
