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Demonstration October 2013 Simple Turning Projects for the Shop

Tool handles – **Drew Shelton** Carver's Maul – **David Dick** Tapers & Hot Melt – **Jim Spano**

It is always interesting when CTWA presents a panel of demonstrators. Thanks to **Stacey Hager** for arranging three excellent turners to inform and amuse us. **David Dick** began the demonstration by turning a mallet between two centers with a skew. For those who are reluctant to use a skew, remember that we have volunteers who will help you learn control. David pointed out that the advantage of using a skew is a reduction in sanding time. If you do







not own a mallet, this is one of the best ways to build one that is custom to your hand, and that reflects your individual style.





Drew Shelton took the next segment and talked about tool handles. There are multiple choices on the market for tool handles, and it can get very expen-



sive. Making your own tool handle is easy, as David showed us, you can customize it to your hand and style. When you drill the hole in the end of the tool handle, be sure to set it to the same size as your tool. Pick a ferrule, then set the tenon to fit that ferrule. Do not skip the step to place the ferrule, because the tool is unsafe without one.

Jim Spano rounded out the demonstration with ideas for holding small projects. He made wooden morse tapers to hold the small projects like napkin rings. Jim rounds over the points of the caliper so it doesn't catch as he measure the spindle, then you can use your thin parting tool in conjunction with the caliper. Jim uses a hand-made jig of blocks that he glued together using a #2 morse taper as the original guide for the blocks. Then, as he builds the taper, he uses this jig to check his angle accuracy. For speed, he uses hot melt to bind the blocks.



Meeting Location
