February Demonstration Beads, Beads, Beads Johnny Tolly

Johnny Tolly, supported by his brother, Jimmy Tolly, provided an informational demonstration on his process for making beads out of various materials, i.e., antlers, wood, plastic. Cutting the



lengths related to the diameter. Johnny used a 9/64" drill index short bit to reduce the oscillation while hollow-



ing the bead. He used a pen-turners' chuck also to reduce wobbling. and two chucks. Using Niles Bottle stopper drive and the Niles bead special



mandrel to mount the material on the lathe. Drill a 5/16" hole 1.5" deep to push/ pop the stack bead off in case it gets stuck.

Johnny used various finishing techniques for sanding and finishing. He used sandpaper from Vincent Welch *vince@woodnWonders.com* and alumalite to wet sand. He used a 1/4" HS

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stell skew from Robert Sorby to turn the bead. If the bead became stuck he used a 8/31 concrete nail to push the bead off.

Johnny noted that the uses for beads go beyond jewelry, and can spice up various projects from bowls to bird feeders.



CTWA would like to thank Johnny for an entertaining and different way to look at turning beads. We also appreciated his mentioning the importance of safety techniques.

Editor's "Turn"

the morning with Johnny and Marcia Tolly. Johnny took me through a personal class on hollowing out globes for Christmas ornaments. Using his custom-engineered setup, I didn't blow up a ball! The VicMark hollowing system was amazing in how easy it was to use and I was impressed at how smooth the articulation of the arm was for me.

What most impressed me were the various ways that Johnny has figured out how to streamline an ornament production. He has a special jig that he made for removing the tenon on a hollowed globe. The man has figured out ingenious ways for making the entire process easy (or at least it looked easy).

I came away with lots of things to think about, like whether to invest in the hollowing system. Of course, there's a small skew from Robert Sorby that I will be ordering!

Steven Green was with me and learned a lot about how to stabilize wood, add color to the wood that is stabilized, and answers to all his questions about the process.

Marcia Tolly, who is always the penultimate artist, showed us her game that she had finished making. She also gave her perspective on what makes an ornament pretty.

I also learned some things about sanding that I didn't know, particularly removing bumps—by reversing the lathe intermittently forward and backward. I had heard of this technique, but never really understood the full explanation.

Now, my background includes teaching, so I am always impressed with good teachers. Johnny is one good teacher! He showed me the process of hollowing, then turned it over to me to get a hands-on feel for how to do it.

I kept notes so I wouldn't have to call him all the time to find out how to do something—that doesn't mean I won't be calling him, but hopefully it will lessen the times I have to pick his brain.

What I have always loved about woodturning is the caliber of people I have met. I have never met more giving people than Johnny and Marcia.

I am hopeful with this lesson that I can be a better turner and can only aspire to be as giving of my time and talent as Johnny and Marcia.

So, for those of you who might not know how to do something, be sure to ask someone for help. I have found that any woodturner is more than happy to share his or her talent. When I allow myself to be humble enough to ask for help, I am always rewarded.

A good case in point is the upcoming beginner's class—our members who give their time and talents in this venue are experts in their respective areas.

If you haven't been to a class put on by CTWA or been to someone else's shop to discover how to do something, I suggest you become a little humble and get out of your own shop to discover all the talent that is in our club.



Meeting Location

The CTWA meets at American YouthWorks, 1901 East Ben White Boulevard (Texas 71) in south Austin. The building is on the south side of Ben White, just east of Interstate 35. The best entry is off Woodward Street, just south of a little strip center. You enter an alleyway into a lighted parking lot. We will enter through the back door. As you drive in, you will see a truck dock in the back of the building with a big roll-up white door. The entryway is just to the right of the truck dock. Folks coming from the north may want to exit I-35 at Woodward and proceed south on Woodward across Ben White.
