May Demonstration **Weed Pots Craig Timmerman**



Craig Timmerman is always one of our best demonstrators. This month he repeated the tutorial he gave at the beginner's class last month. First, Craig says it is a good idea to draw out your design on a whiteboard. This



allows you to see the context and shape before you start tearing into the wood.

After rounding a 2-1/2" to 3" spindle of wood he makes the tenon and mounts it on a chuck. Craig then rounds the block of mesquite and marks where the bottom, top of the onion bulb and the curves of the neck. He then starts to shape the bottom and bulb. He moves to the neck and begins forming an ogee that will form the curve of the neck. He points out not to

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start at the narrowest part of the curve, since you are still working on the overall shape. When you get to the neck, keep going back and forth to the bulb to ensure your form stays in symmetry. After he gets his shape, he is ready to drill out the opening of the weed pot.

Craig notes a few reminders: 1) if you



are going to put an insert (like a test tube) to hold water in the weed pot, then be sure to drill deeper than the insert. By doing this, you allow room for an air gap. Otherwise, you'll have difficulty getting the insert in due to the compressed air at the bottom of the hole.

2) Using a drill bit that is smaller than the diameter of the smallest part of the neck, drill the hole for the weeds (or insert). Note that not all inserts are consistent, some are US measurement, and some are metric. You can also drill a small hole through the bottom to relieve the air pressure.



Unfortunately, there was a bit of punky wood in the neck of Craig's piece, so the form ended up shorter in the neck. 3) It's always a good idea to check your wood for cracks, but in this case,

Craig's break happened in a place that couldn't be seen from the outside.



Champion that Craig is, he finished up correcting the shape of the weed pot and it still looked pretty good.



Craig was kind enough to share some of his best examples and some boo boo examples in his past weed pot forms. We appreciated this perspective, because sometimes it's easier to see a good form by comparing it to forms that are not perfect.



Craig noted that larger forms are easier to get the shape right—the smaller forms have less tolerance for finishing a good design. The length of your weed pot depends on your design, but 2x the diameter is a good starting point. The neck should be about 1/3 the diameter of the bulb.

Reverse chuck to remove the bottom by creating a jig that will go into the center hole, then use it as a jam chuck.

Other reminders he shared were: 4) Keeping the tail stock engaged is safer while you are forming the pot. The tools that Craig used were a beading/parting tool, 1/2" spindle or bowl gouge, and a scraper (mesquite wood does great with a scraper to begin finishing and removing tool marks.

5) Use a twist bit rather than a Forstner bit due to the depth you'll be drilling—the Forstner bit will get extremely hot.

If you want to reduce friction on the bit, apply some wax onto the bit.

6) Use dry wood for weed pots. This is not as critical for mesquite due to the properties that it has while drying. However, other woods will warp pretty severely if turned wet.

Craig used a solution of 50 % lacquer and 50% lacquer thinner to finish out the piece. Keep the lathe going faster than sanding speed to apply the finish. Then between applications use a heavy-duty paper towel rather than cloth. He doesn't sand between these coats, the paper towel smooths out any small ridges in the light coats of finish.

Deft finish will water spot, so you can use a product like Pledge to get out the water spots. He applies Polycril (sp?) from Minwax on the bottom.

Editor's "Turn"

I had a lot of fun creating a weed pot after watching Craig Timmermon's demonstration. I have to admit, the hardest part of the process was getting the curve right. But then that's the hardest part of creating a Cindy Drozda finial as well. I found it was incredibly hard to keep a balanced curve through the neck, while minding how thick that neck was going to be in relationship to the bulb. On the whole, it wasn't too bad, but not nearly as cool as Craig's. Guess I'll have to keep working at this!

I found out about those stupid glass inserts. After ordering them, I drilled my hole (leaving lots of space at the bottom for air, per Craig's instructions). Then, I tried inserting the darn glass and guess what . . . it didn't fit. I have no idea if the glass is metric or what . . . but clearly I don't have the right bit to fit the shape. Craig warned us about this in his demon . . . rats.

I decided I needed to consider if I was going to pay for the bit that fit the glass, or just give the glass to someone who might have a desire to create these. ARGH

I also signed up for the Eli Avisera workshop. This was a tremendous commitment from me, as my Navy boy will be rolling into Austin on the same day as the workshop! I'll probably have to leave early, and I'm sure the little time I get to spend with this master will be worth it.

Summer is hot, muggy and fun. It's my second favorite season, after Spring. Thankfully, Steve & I have an air con-

ditioned shop, so when the days get to be "Dog Day Summer Hot", we'll close up the door and turn that baby on!

Meeting Location
