September Demonstration **Robert Edwards** Presentation of the Tool to the Wood

Robert Edwards traveled from San Antonio to demonstrate various turning tools and their affect on wood.



Robert started us off with a spindle roughing gouge, then a skew, demonstrating how fine the turning can be by shearing off the wood fibers.





He then went on to a home-made bead and parting tool



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Then he demonstrated a spindle gouge.



Then naturally on to the bowl gouge.





What made Robert's demonstration interesting was he talked about the bevel on each of the tools and how to most effectively use it in each application. Hollowing, he used a custommade tool, but the same thing can be accomplished with various hollowing

Editor's "Turn"

Since Steve started turning professionally, we often go to art shows that feature some amazing artists. Local folks and out-of-town folks come out to look at the various artists' wares and buy a precious gem to take home or give as a gift.

We've been really lucky. Some members like Charlie Kay, Jimmy and Johnny Tolly, and Craig Timmerman have proved to be incredible mentors.

Before we invested in a tent, we borrowed Johnny's tent, for our very first show at the Ben McColloch site. We made some sales and decided this was the way to go. We didn't make a lot of money, but we had a ton of fun.

We then bought our first tent, called a pop-up tent shortly after that show. Charlie Kay was not going to be able to participate in the Buda Fine Arts show because he had just moved. So we applied and got in! Charlie helped us put on the sides for this show in Buda. Now, this was quite a feat, because the wind was blowing about 40 mph and the sides were not very heavy. In fact, think of a sheet you might put on your bed (except the side is a rayon-type material). It looked like we were trying to launch the darned tent. But with Charlie's help we got the darn thing up. That year (our first year of shows), Steve won Best of Show! Well, we knew we had something going then!!

So, Steve joined various shows that required a jury to participate. We had so much fun meeting other artists and the patrons who trekked out to the art shows.

Over the years Steve kept putting out incredible art that people wanted to buy. The down side was our tent was showing the wear. I don't mean smudges of dirt, I mean the darned thing started leaking.

This is a problem because the art shows don't happen when the weather is calm in Texas. They happen in the Fall and the Spring...not exactly predictable weather times.

The old tent leaked like a sieve, often marring the wood, even though it was finished poly or lacquer.

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We took it to Midland, for the first time we had ever done that show. Now, I grew up in West Texas, and my experience was that it rarely rained hard in September. In fact, it's one of the few seasons that doesn't have 100 mph winds (yes 100 mph) and huge dust storms.

Unfortunately, they had an incredible wave of storms come through that dumped a ton, I mean a ton by anyone's standards, of rain. Yes, you guessed it. We got wet, had to put away the art for the biggest parts of the storm because of the leaky tent. But it was a good show anyway.

Coming off that, plus the previous Spring's storms, we decided to bite the bullet and buy the tent like Craig Timmerman has. It's the Cadillac of tents. It has marine quality covers and even a little awning, breeze slits (like you'd see on a barn), and five million steel rods to assemble. The pop up tent didn't have any assembly except the sides. Oh dear, we were in the big time

Oh my goodness, you should have seen Steve putting the darned thing together the first time in our front vard! The dogs and I watched from a safe distance inside the house. Neighbors stopped their cars to ask him what he was doing.

But this pre-planning worked out. Before the next show in Georgetown, we both watched the accompanying video that the manufacturer sent along with the tent.

For the September Georgetown art show, we finally bit the bullet and paid the largest entry fee we had ever paid to get into a juried show. The people who put on the show also do several really big shows around Austin, like the Domain. So, our expectations were that we would do really well and pay for the new tent.

So, here we are with brand-spakin' new tent in the big show...that flopped. Yes, it is possible for shows to run their course we found out. Somehow the show didn't get the crowd, or at least the buying crowd to come out. So, the show promoters said it would be the last year that they did the show. I couldn't help but think, "Why the heck didn't you tell us that before we entered?" But those thoughts are better left unsaid.

As it turned out, we did OK, broke even. Then, we decided we were going to go for the next show, which will be in San Antonio.

The part of this story that is the bummer is that when art shows don't pay off for the artists, then the entire community suffers.

So, if you ever get the chance to spend an hour or two at an art show that is in your neighborhood, I wish you'd go, take your kids, grand kids, friends and neighbors. Without the arts, then the world is just a little darker.

Oh, and if you see they have a cool tent, tell them! They most likely spent hours putting the darned thing up!



LIBRARY NEW NEWS

Stephen Van Gee sent some news that he has some great new videos by **Eli Avisera** in the CTWA library.

Series 1 Beginner

Volume 1 - Disc 1 of 2 - Series introduction; Eli introduces his specialized tool range, showing how to use and how sharpen them. *Volume 1 – Disc 2 of 2 -* Continued series introduction; Eli introduces his specialized tool range, showing how to use and how sharpen them. Volume 2 - In this episode, Eli introduces us to his methods of spindle turning by producing a simple candlestick from a predetermined plan; demonstrating the practice of copy-turning. Volume 3 - In this episode, Eli introduces us to his methods of bowl turning by producing a simple bowl to demonstrate the double bevels of his Bowl Turning Gouges

ishing techniques. *Volume 4* - In this episode, Eli introduces us to his methods of end-grain turning by producing a simple lidded box embellished with both texturing and coloring. Volume 5 - In this episode, Eli continues to demonstrate his methods for end grain turning by producing a simple goblet and in the process, shows us how to utilize propor-

Series 2 – Intermediate Level

tions

Volume 1 - In this episode, Eli introduces us to his methods of spindle turning by producing a pair of elegant candlesticks from a predetermined plan; demonstrating the practice of copy-turning.

Volume 2 - In this episode, Eli continues to show his methods of bowl turning by producing a large platter to demonstrate the double bevels

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of his Bowl Turning Gouges and Finishing Tool for superior finishing techniques.

Volume 3 - Prepare to be amazed! In this film, Eli continues his tuition on bowl turning but this time with added bonus of texturing. Volume 4 - In this episode, we cover both spindle working and end-grain turning. Eli also continues to wow us with his superior texturing methods.

Volume 5 - This episode covers the method for turning long and thin projects. Eli uses the Trembleur as his example.

Volume 6 – This film endeavours to teach the ideal methods for thinwall hollowing. The use of light to demonstrate even wall thickness for an overall delicate piece developed into some amazing film footage. Volume 7 - Disc 1 of 2. The Emboque Game. This project shows a simple method to achieve a perfect sphere along with a refresher on spindle turning. Disc 2 of 2. The Christmas Tree. This chapter demonstrates what can be achieved with good skew chisel control.

Series 3 Advanced Level

Volume 1 − In this film, Eli demonstrates his method of producing his trade-mark segmented blanks. This will prepare the viewer for the subsequent projects of the Rude Osolnik Candlesticks, the Goblet Box and the Star Box. Volume 2 – In this film, Eli concludes his demonstration of spindle turning methods by producing a pair of elegant Rude Osolnik style candlesticks from a pre-determined plan; consolidating the practice of copy-turning and using his Segmented Star Blank made in Volume 1.

Volume 3 – Prepare to be amazed again! In this film, Eli concludes

his tuition on bowl turning but this time with an added bonus of segmenting. Eli shows the formula how to calculate the sizes of segments needed to make any size howl

Volume 4 – This film introduces the Eli Avisera Lignotec Compound Slide Jig. Eli begins by making the outside form of a standard bowl from holly. Then the magic begins: Cutting V slots into the profile and then inserting laminated segments made from ebony, maple and blood wood, the project is brought to life. *Volume 5* – This film concludes the methods of turning long and thin projects. This time Eli uses the Goblet Box as his example, utilizing the Segmented Star blank demonstrated in Volume 1 to compliment a somewhat ambitious project, and show the possible variations.

Volume 6 – The penultimate film and we're back to the Segmented Star blank made in Volume 1. Eli demonstrates a beautiful variation of box making that holds huge potential for similar box making projects but he doesn't leave it there: Once made, Eli's Star box is then decorated using color and piercing.

Volume 7 – In this the final film of the course; thanks to Eli's ingenuity, this film shows some of the most unique film footage ever captured. Eli begins the film by turning a hollow form from green wood then a hollow form without sides in order to show exactly what the tool is doing including how to use a laser guided hollowing tool rig. The theme is finished by demonstrating piercing methods.

Meeting Location

The CTWA meets at American YouthWorks, 1901 East Ben White Boulevard (Texas 71) in south Austin. The building is on the south side of Ben White, just east of Interstate 35.
