### Demonstration Stacey Hager

Stacey Hager is one of the top woodturners in our club. He can sharpen any tool and determine the best cut to create a specific affect on wood. He can turn just about any thing, but always, always his finishes are supreme. Stacey presented his techniques for attaining high quality finishes. All of us love to turn, not as many like to sand, but Stacey demonstrated the best way to sand and finish a piece. Some of the products he uses are: Xtreme Clean Duster, Zinsser Bull's Eye Shellac, Krylon UV Resistant Matte, Kryolong Crystal Clear Spray Coating, Gemini High Performance Finishes, Waterlox Original Sealer Finisher, Waterlox High Gloss High Gloss Finish, a foam brush and an applesauce container. He uses the PC compressed air (to clean computer parts) to collapse the Waterlox container over time.

## Random Ruminations "The Wood Calls" by Charlie Kay

When I decided to not bring my mini-lathe with me on my adventure, I pretty much figured that working with wood was out of the picture until this experiment is done. I had sold almost all of my carving tools when I was clearing out my shop, but I briefly contemplated sticking in the palm gouges that I had retained and some carving knives. In the end, however, they were consigned to one of the last boxes I took to the storage locker.

Granddaughter Lydia is a very bright seven year old and interested in everything and believes she can do anything. I have really enjoyed the chance to spend some time with her over the last couple of weeks. A week or two before I got here, she had seen pictures of whittled balls in cages and chain links on line and shared them with her dad, who told her, "Grandpa knows how to make those." Indeed I do. The first summer camp our Boy Scout troop ran in Sequoia National Park, I was prevailed upon to teach crafts, including wood carving and leather work, neither of which I had ever tried. But never one to dodge a challenge, I managed to coach a group of eleven-year-olds into whittling some neckerchief slides. In the course of a week of lessons, in which I did as much or more whittling on their slides as they did, I carved a number of slides of my own to try to inspire them, and by the end of the session, I was a pretty good whittler. I continued to teach the wood carving merit badge for the next seven or eight years. We were a backpacking troop, training in the Tehachapis and the San Gabriels, and taking long-term hikes in the Sierra Nevada in the summer. Those mountains are full of sugar maple trees, and there are fallen limbs everywhere. Along with basswood and tupelo, sugar pine is one of the primo carving woods of North America. So, on weekend camp outs or training hikes, I would pick up a fallen sugar pine limb and sit around the campfire on Friday and Saturday evening and whittle a ball in a cage or chain links and give the finished product to the Scout who had impressed me on the camp out at the next troop meeting. I haven't done one since the last long-term hike I did in 1987.

Now, Lydia wanted to know if I could teach her how to "carve wood." She had been using a big Swiss Army knife (at least better steel and sharper than the Boy Scout knives the young Scouts used in 1976) but it was way to big and clumsy for even me to use to try to whittle with. I didn't bring proper carving tools, and only brought a diamond hone with two grits, both too coarse to achieve a carving edge. Lydia and I walked over to the local Michael's where I bought some basswood. At least I could get my dull pocket knife, and the impossible "carving knife" I picked up at Michael's shaped and semi-sharp for her to use. When her dad got home, he dug out the whet stones I had given him and I made more progress toward a usable edge. We started work when Lydia got home from school. Mostly, although like all of us she is anxious to make something, I spent the time teaching her how to hold the knife and how to get the cutting edge angles where they should be, then just making tiny, thin, and consistent cuts. Yes, I know that is even more boring than turning beads and coves as a beginning turner, but she has more patience than her grandpa does, and worked at it until her hand got tired. She follows instructions well and understands the explanations well, but this is going to take awhile.

Meanwhile, she was out of town last weekend at a junior roller derby clinic. You thought my granddaughter was a wimp? So I drove to the local Woodcraft store to pick up a Flexcut Carvin' Jack. If you aren't a woodcarver, look it up on the web. It is a clever tool, typically Flexcut sharp, and ideal for carving while camping. So, tonight I spent a couple of hours with it and a piece of basswood. I started on a ball in a cage. I have three nights before I see her again this weekend, so I should have it ready to give to her by then, to further inspire her. I don't have anything that difficult laid out for her, but I do have her started on whittling an apple.

Meanwhile, I had forgotten how satisfying and relaxing sitting and whittling can be. I have a feeling that I will be doing a bit more whittling before the year is done.





### Meeting Location
