



# Random Ruminations "Waiting for the Muse" by Charlie Kay

When I agreed to take on this gig, I thought It would be as easy as it was when I did it every month. Writing is still easy for me, but I am doing a lot of it, some of it with overlapping audiences, and some for different audiences. This column, for instance, has some overlap with my blog, as with my journal entry for the day. I also have several people who are sometimes getting only parts of that same information. When I thought about my objectives for this column late last year, I had planned to have something each month that had something at least vaguely related to wood, although it might not have much to do with woodworking or woodturning, but maybe observing different trees that I would see in my hikes might inspire something.

Most of the time, that works okay, but sometimes it hangs me up. Usually that is because I spend whole days doing other things, like a long hike, or a travel day, or sometimes unexpected complications. That is often when the muse decides to take the day off. After a couple of false starts, I sometimes just start typing, hoping that something will finally start leaking from my finger tips, and usually it does. That worked last month and resulted in what I thought was a pretty good essay. So I am trying the same approach this month.

This has been one of those weeks when what could go wrong does go wrong. When I left Azalea Glen, that magical RV park across the road from Patrick's Point State Park I didn't have anything going on. By the end of the day, it occurred to me that I should have taken photos of chainsaw carvings of redwood bears, fish, or various other fauna, that had seemed too kitschy to consider, but is the height of northern California roadside art. Then it occurred to me that I should have stopped at one of the numerous myrtle wood shops, the height of Oregon kitsch. I thought, "No problem, I'll just stop at a myrtle shop tomorrow."

I checked out of Humbug Mountain State Park, and anticipated a good day. It was almost dusk the next day when I checked into Honeyman State Park. My backing skills have been improving significantly, but this time I got into a tight situation where I needed to turn around, and ran out of room to remedy the situation and jack-knifed the trailer. That was when "the best laid plans ... gang aft agley." I knocked the propane bottles loose. I spent a good deal of time the next morning jerry rigging, with various bungee cords, clamps and straps, a reasonably secure temporary mounting. No problem, I thought, I'll just get a new unit and install it as I would at home. However, I forgot to mark my wires, and the new unit wouldn't work, I decided to pay someone to troubleshoot and fix the problem. After all, I had worked hard for a lot of years so that I could pay someone to do these things in my old age. So I buttoned everything up, and went to a professional this morning to resolve the problem. Maybe I have learned another lesson, and will have time to come up with an essay idea before the deadline next month.

### **SWAT August 26-28**

On August 26-28th (Friday - Sunday noon) the Southwest Association of Wood Turners (SWAT) will hold it's annual symposium in Waco, TX at the Waco Convention Center. Around 900 people across multiple states attend.

This is the second largest wood turning symposium in the Americas. World class demonstrators come from all over the world to share their talents and inspire ideas. Registration is only \$140 for the entire symposium. Guest passes are available at a reduced fee.

Complimenting the national demonstrators there are many regional woodturners who are especially talented in their own right.

Each demonstrator spends one and one-half hours turning a piece that represents their specialty. To say the least, no matter what your interest, there will be multiple demonstrators from whom you can learn, or minimally, be inspired.

Additionally, the caterer provides delicious noon meals where you will join other turners across the states and swap stories. You can buy a ticket for the Burger Bar on Friday night for only \$12.

Lest you think that your spouse would be bored, think again. There are activities for the spouses throughout the symposium. This includes art, tours, and a chance to get to know other folks.

Each symposium includes drawings. You can buy tickets to join the fun (and help keep the SWAT registration fees low). There is the two-for-one drawing—meaning you can win a beautiful piece or tools and still be entered in the grand drawing for a lathe on Sunday.

Another drawing happens for a special

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piece that each lead demonstrator typically offers a special piece that you can win.

The grand prize drawing happens after lunch on Sunday! Vendors offer a lathe that you can win.

The two-for-one and lead demonstrator drawings happen on Saturday night at the banquet. Banquet tickets are \$35/ person, and definitely will ensure a good meal and a lot of fun.

Even more than the demonstrators, there are vendors that often will sell tools, wood, face protection, sand paper, or lathe parts (e.g., chucks) for a reduced "show price."

The local hotels offer a show rate if you tell them you are attending SWAT. The best part? The entire show is affordable. In fact, the entry registration is discounted if you register before the show.

No matter your experience level of turning, this show is not to be missed. Plan on attending! Most of the people who attended in the past will go every year. It's that good.

### AAW June 9-12

Another symposium worthy of consideration is the American Association of Woodturners. June 9-12 about 1400 people from all over the world will flock to Atlanta to participate in this symposium.

Similar to SWAT, AAW has premier demonstrators across a plethora of topics. Bowl, spindle, finishing, hollowing—you name it and it is there. Registration is Members: \$325, Non-

Stephen Van Gee invited club members to his lovely shop and back yard for May's first Saturday. About 26 people attended.










