Demonstration Dwight Schaeper Iridescent Finish

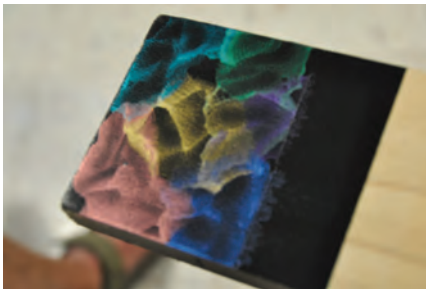
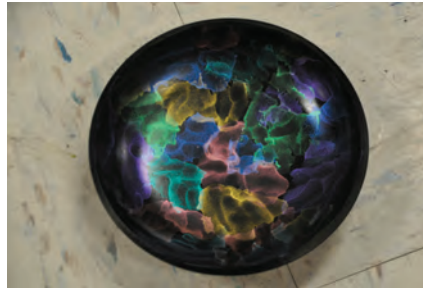
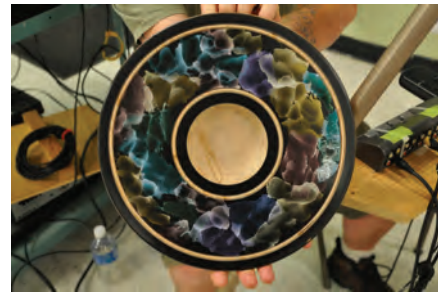
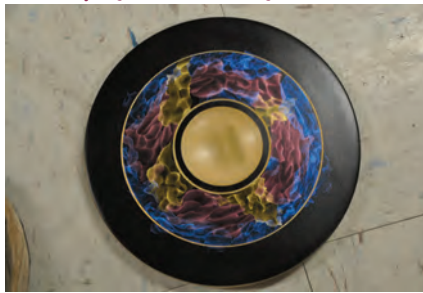

About the only type of turning that doesn't interest me is pen turning. Now, you pen turners don't get upset with me. I LOVE wood pens, I just am too impatient to do all the setup for (what seems to me) a tiny amount of turning. Steve has all the equipment

to make his own pen blanks using Aluminite and Cactus juice. He also has been looking at techniques that other pen turners use to create pens that honor our servicemen and women.

Me, I like a good bowl, a fine finial. I'm not that great at boxes, but I enjoy the process.

What is your favorite thing to turn?

Who do you want to talk with at SWAT about their techniques?

Plan now to join the SWAT demonstrations that will spark your creativity and answer your questions.

Also, my recommendation is for SWAT mealtimes, try to sit at a table with folks you don't know. And ask them what their favorite thing to turn is, and how they do it.

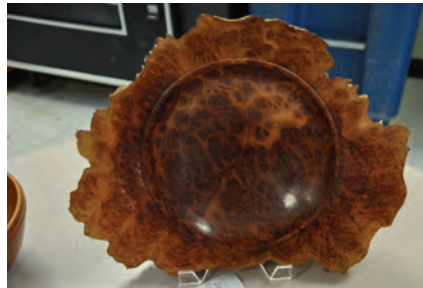

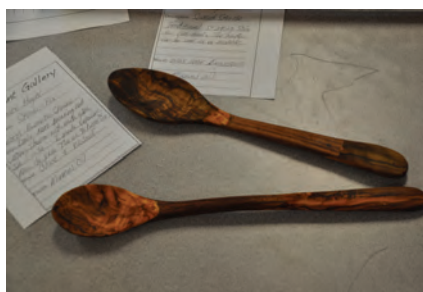
