WANT TO IMPROVE CTWA? DON'T WAIT TO BE ASKED TO VOLUNTEER

In the past 3 years, our club has grown over 100%! We have also increased our female membership 500%! That's right, we have doubled the number of active members and provided a draw to many more women turners

In my experience that kind of growth of a volunteer or social club comes out of several key things that go way beyond any one officer in the club:

- 1. People participate in the social gatherings. For example, we have traditionally had over 36 people attend every First Saturday! First Saturdays are a time of having fun, learning new techniques and solving the world's problems! Men and women alike. Our Christmas party attendance grew to the largest yet! We used to all fit in Pat's beautiful dining room!
- 2. Minimal interpersonal conflict. Anytime you get over 100 people in a club, there are going to be personality conflicts. However, CTWA has always been a relaxed club with very little social tension. Members go out of their way to welcome newcomers.
- 3. Focused meetings with minimal business items and primarily the time goes to the purpose of the club. In our case, the business meeting our business of running the club typically 5% to 11% of the time. Our President maintaining a tight business agenda goes a long way for making that happen. On average here's how it shakes out (percentages may not add to 100):

5-11% Business 67% Demonstration 28% for Gallery and Bring Backs

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- 4. **Timeliness**. CTWA meetings typically begin and end on time.
- 5. **Strong base of Volunteers.** The volunteer base goes beyond demonstrators. No board member is paid.

Our SWAT volunteers ensure that this 2nd largest turning symposium occurs without a hitch. Our club provides set-up and tear down.

Volunteers also help out at our club-sponsored classes. This includes the shop, demonstrators and helpers.

Volunteers arrive early to set up the meetings, and stay late to restore the room to AYW's needs.

- 6. **Fiscal management.** A consistent treasurer who reports financial status, maintains a 3 month reserve (minimum), and agrees to annual audits.
- 7. Top-flight demonstrators.

Our program chairperson brings in world-class demonstrators to teach us their techniques. The week-long event includes two trainings to beginner, intermediate and advanced turners, plus an all day demonstration event.

8. Community Service Events.

We are lucky to have American Youth Works provide us with rent-free space for our meetings. CTWA gives back with an annual gift of money. Plus our members participate in their Senior Pen Turning day, their annual fund raising auction by donating turnings to be auctioned. Additionally, the past 3 years we have participated in the Beads of Courage boxes that go to ill children at Strictly Pediatrics Children's Hospital, a part of the Dell Children's hospital network.

9. **Strong outbound communication.** Our website, group mail list, newsletter and participation in AAW announcements add up to

easy access to information that is pertinent to the craft of woodturning. Whether it is a tree that fell and needs to be cut-up, equipment for sale, or where the next First Saturday will be held, multiple channels of information flow is extremely important to club members.

10. Fun competitive events. The President's Challenge is always lots of fun. Jay made a commitment to have 6 of these this year. Additionally, he'll be handing out prizes for 1st and 2nd place! This is a great way for both experienced and novice turners to playfully learn more about woodturning.

So, how can you help keep the club strong? The answers are simple: don't wait to be asked—volunteer; participate in any of the above named events; respect the demonstrator; demonstrate something you do in your shop; take a leadership role on the board; host a First Saturday, invite new people to join us! And most importantly? Have fun!

November Demonstration **Tips & Tricks Panel**

Dwight Schaeper, Jim Spano, John Lovelady, Jimmy Tolly, Johnny Tolly and Hilda Carpenter shared ideas for making your turning easier.

Dwight showed his donut chuck





Johnny Tollyshowed his down-spout for catching segments; his depth





checker tool for small, round objects; his curtain rod as a depth gauge for keeping from creating donuts (going through the bottom); his technique for finding the center of wood; and his method for sanding inside of hollow forms. He also showed his maple salt & mesquite pepper shakers with their dishes for keeping the mess out

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of the kitchen; as well as his tail stock adapter.









Jimmy Tolly showed his C setup for going through the bottom.



Jim Spano showed how to keep glue from drying out in the bottle; he also



demonstrated his famous pencil finder.



Jim is known for his home-made tools



These were made from truck and auto engine valves.



Another trick Jim showed was to hot glue a magnet onto a pencil so it will



stick to your lathe. He used a speaker magnet to catch the filings from a grinder.

November Demonstration Tips & Tricks Panel

Jim Spano uses cut pvc placed inside the chuck to safely secure small work without marking the piece. To punch



out sand paper use a muffler 3" pipe. Use a mirror to look at the bottom of a piece to see the small scratches.



To get sanding dust from microcloth use the back side of foam sandpaper. A medicine pill dispenser is great for holding shavings.

John Lovelady demonstrated his way of securing hollow forms with an innovative, reusable jam chuck.





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Hilda Carpenter talked about two techniques she uses for sharpening tools. First the Raptor angle gauges with the OneWay jig and wolverine system, and the Stuart Batty angle gauge used on the flat panel for sharpening free-handed.





Our members got a lot of information from this month's meeting. If you have any questions about the various techniques, do not fail to ask the demonstrators.

Business Meeting

Pat Little opened the meeting by welcoming visitors: Dale Thompson, Sam Takkashvani, Judy Terlik and Robert Cox.

Blair Feller announced 2015 membership dues renewal: \$35 single and \$40 family. Please pay Blair either at the Christmas Party, tonight, or before January 1.

Pat reminded everyone that the Christmas party December 13 will be at her and Clyde's house. 9 am for a first-Saturday shop and then lunch. The club will provide the meat and a sign-up sheet for sides will be passed around. Then we will have a sharing of turning gifts similar to a white elephant game.

Pat thanked everyone for her time as President. She moved the club forward into one of the best clubs in AAW. We now have nice badges (if you don't have one, contact Blair, they are \$5).

Pat then announced that she has been working with Pat Jenkins to redo the bylaws of our club. She said that AAW and SWAT are requiring clubs to become 501(c)3 non-profit corporations. Pat called for a vote, but was interrupted by members asking for a discussion prior to a vote. After extensive discussion, Greg withdrew his motion. Hilda **Carpenter** made a motion to table the incorporation discussion until the full board had an opportunity to review this proposal. Charlie Kay seconded the motion and it was passed.

Pat then presented the slate of officers for 2015. Each was unanimously approved without other recommendations for selection

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to the club each month. They are also responsible for locating the feature turner for 2016 class for our members. If you have ever wanted to contribute your talents to the club, this is a perfect opportunity to make a really big difference
