# Program Chair Mike Josephs

Since our last newsletter, we have had two incredible demonstrations for our club at American Youthworks. The first was on thread chasing and was presented by Kirk DeHeer from Utah. We had strong attendance, both in person and online, and we were treated to a very educational and fun demo. I know some of our members have already attempted thread chasing with success, and I hope to see some boxes with threaded lids at our upcoming bring backs and/or show-and-tells. Kirk had a great time in Austin and, as a tip for our next program chair,

he is willing to return to teach us again in the future.

Our other demonstration occurred on the first Saturday of May, presented by none other than the King of the Skew, Alan Lacer. We spent the entire day with Alan and had the opportunity to purchase his book along with some of his tools. Alan drove from Wisconsin to be with us, and in addition to his club demos on making a lidded box and the use of the skew chisel, he held workshops on the same topics at the Little's shop. The classes were sold out and I received comments such as "This was the best class I've ever taken" and "This has been incredibly helpful" from our members. I'm hopeful that his instruction helped to reduce the intimidation that is often attached to using the skew chisel, and we should be seeing pieces displayed at our meetings that have been made with this versatile and clean-cutting tool.

I myself will be demonstrating at our July first Saturday meeting on making spatulas, and I intend to use only the skew to complete the turning.

There's still more to look forward to in May! Noah Peters is visiting us from Oklahoma and at our third Tuesday meeting, Noah will demonstrate his method of bowl coring. His production is prolific, as evidenced by the hundreds of roughed out bowls he has at SWAT for sale. Noah has been

recognized for his abilities by the AAW, receiving the POP Excellence Award at the Portland, Oregon symposium last year. He also received a grant and studied with Glenn Lucas in Ireland. It's wonderful to see a talented, young turner excel in the craft, and we are fortunate to have the opportunity to learn from him. In addition to his demo. Noah will teach workshops on roughing out wet bowls and finishing dried, warped once-turned bowls, you won't want to miss these!

Noah will also be bringing an assortment of his rough-turned bowls to Austin, so if you're in the market, make sure to have funds with you at the meeting.

At the moment, the only other workshop I have planned for the year will occur in September. We will have a very special guest visiting us from Zagreb, Croatia. I will provide more information on Tomislav Tomasic as the date approaches, for those unfamiliar with him. But trust me, he is an incredible turner with a huge range of skills and I'm very excited for his visit.

In July our demonstration will be given by our own Herb Ingram! I believe that Herb has displayed his pieces at every Tuesday meeting since I joined the club in 2021, so it's about time we all had the pleasure of watching him turn.

But we will teach you the few tricks you will need to know.

Also, SWAT is just around the corner. We need an A/V operator and a room host for each demonstration. I will pass around a sign-up sheet on Tuesday. Those interested in being an A/V operator, but with no experience, can intern at the A/V control station during the next few Tuesday meetings. It will include observation and hands on training. Old hands at A/V are already good to go.

#### SWAT News By Drew Shelton

#### Reminder: Waco hotels are filling very fast. If you are going to SWAT but have not reserved your hotel please do so ASAP.

This year's Southwest Area Turners (SWAT) event will be held on August 22-24 in Waco. Registration opened March 3rd, and hotel reservations opened on February 10th. The two symposium hotels are the Hilton and the Marriott Courtyard. They tend to fill up quickly, so get your room ASAP if you want to be within walking distance. There are also other hotels in the area as well.

If you've never been to SWAT, you really should give it a try. Lead demonstrators from all over the country and regional demonstrators from the SWAT area will be doing demonstrations on topics you might not have tried before. And if any of those topics require tools you don't have, lots of vendors will be ready to sell them to you. You'll find woods you might never have seen before and tools you suddenly realize you can't live without. The Instant Gallery will both amaze and inspire with hundreds of beautiful turnings. There is also a 2-for-1 raffle where you have chances to win donated gallery items, tools, and even lathes.

As CTWA's SWAT rep for this year, I attended the Board of Directors meeting on January 25th. I brought up that the concrete floor in our demonstration room causes reverberation with our audio. SWAT might be able to get us some floor pads to help. We'll see if that actually happens or if it even helps.

Another topic at the meeting was the Texas Woodworking Festival. Festival producer Austin Waldo contacted SWAT president Pam Thompson about merging that event with SWAT at a single venue beginning in 2026, perhaps even with a single event registration. This would have the potential to introduce many new people to woodturning. While I don't have a final count of SWAT attendees for last year, the preregistered total was 661. Last year's Festival had over 2000 attendees. The SWAT vendors would likely benefit from so many new potential customers, though the rest of us might feel seriously outnumbered. Nothing was decided at the board meeting, but I came away with

the feeling that this merger is unlikely to happen. For one thing, we'd have to find a much larger venue in a larger city. My personal opinion is while I like the idea of bringing in new people, I greatly prefer keeping SWAT as it is.

Johnny began turning quite a bit when in 1987 he bought a Shopsmith. He started by making toys, some of which you can see in the first photo at the end.

Both are eager to remind everyone that help on setup day (Thursday before SWAT) is always appreciated.



### **Jimmy Tolly**

While Jimmy turned a small amount growing up on a farm in Kansas, his real story with woodturning began in 1983 while living in Connecticut. Watching a DIY series on Saturday morning TV piqued his interest. This led to a purchase of a Total Shop - similar to a ShopSmith. Jimmy was turning segmented pieces early on and began teaching classes at the local ShopSmith store.



After moving to Texas in 1994, Jimmy and his wife bought a piece of property near Dripping Springs where he built his shop - even before building their house! In fact, they lived in what became the shop for 6 months while the house was being built!

Jimmy learned about CTWA from a visit to Paxton's Hardware where CTWA was meeting at the time a number of years ago. He joined in about 1994 and has been active in the association since that time. He finds CTWA particularly enjoyable from the people he is able to interact with – sharing stories, wood and new ideas.

Jimmy has been a member of AAW since his time in Connecticut. He has attended a few of the

national shows including being a demonstrator when the AAW National Show was in San Antonio.


He really enjoys SWAT and began attending back when it was *Texas Turn or Two* and being held at the Maricopa Ranch near Canyon Lake. These days Jimmy along with Johnny and Marcia Tolly form the operations committee for SWAT. Jimmy is the electrical expert at SWAT and manages the electrical setup. The fact that SWAT runs so smoothly can in large part be attributed to this group.

Anytime volunteers are needed you can be assured that Jimmy will be there. For instance, he and Johnny are repairing a lathe that has been donated to CTWA for loaning to new turners.

Jimmy does most of his turning on a big Oneway 2436. Among the many pieces Jimmy turns these days are Bowls, Rolling Pins, Bottle Stoppers, Gnomes, Snow people and Suet Feeders out of local Juniper (what locals call Cedar). The Suet feeders can be found for sale at the Dripping Springs Wild Birds Unlimited store.

Jimmy has a few pieces of advice for new turners. First, while YouTube videos are fine people should really seek out an experienced turner to help with the basics. Second, if you are going to be in your shop turning make sure someone knows to check on you regularly in case of an accident. Lastly, safety first – always use dust protection and a face shield.


## **Skew Demonstration**


